


What is Indigenous Tourism?


"Tourist activity in which Indigenous populations are directly involved, either through control and / or because their culture constitutes the very essence of the attraction".



TYPES OF INDIGENOUS TOURISM

Depending on the degree of control that Indigenous Peoples have over a tourism activity and the extent to which the tourist attraction is based on an Indigenous theme. (Butler and Hinch, 1996)

Culture-Controlled Experiences

- Indigenous Control
- Based on an Indigenous Theme

Diversified Indigenous Dispossessed Culture

- Indigenous Control
- Not Based on an Indigenous Theme (casinos)

- Non-Indigenous Control
- Based on Indigenous Peoples

Non-Indigenous **Tourism**

- Not Controlled by Indigenous Peoples
- Not Based on an Indigenous Theme


I. INTRODUCTION







WITS 2023 Communique: Call to Climate Action

The World Indigenous Tourism Alliance (WINTA) and Western Australian Indigenous Tourism Operators Council (WAITOC) hosted the 2023 World Indigenous Tourism Summit held from 13th to 16th March 2023 on the lands of the Whodjuk people of the Noongar nations.

The summit's theme: 'Tourism and Indigenous Earth Wisdom Weaving the Future that Benefits All' emphasises the role Indigenous values and wisdom play in building tourism to be better equipped to survive in the future, asserting Indigenous rights in our home countries, and nurturing a growing awareness for the need to unite and engage in the equitable development of Indigenous economies globally.

PREAMBLE

The World Indigenous Tourism Alliance (WINTA) was created from the global, collective aspirations of Indigenous interests in tourism. WINTA is an Indigenous initiative that is based on key Indigenous human rights including the right to maintain and strengthen their distinct political, legal, economic, social and cultural institutions.

WINTA is an Indigenous-led global network of Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples and organizations seeking to give practical application to the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) through tourism. WINTA is the guardian of the Larrakia Declaration that establishes principles for the development of Indigenous tourism on an international level based on the UNDRIP.











